This is to ensure threshold. We refer to this an initial enquiry; we take a brief outline of concern, risk and steps that have been taken to safeguard the child so far. We then provide recommendations, which maybe to complete our referral form, or signposting to another service or that threshold/remit is not met. Threshold for direct work with a child/ young person is when there is a live police investigation or court trial OR where there are multiple perpetrators or multiple victims. Threshold for professional consultation is when a child is at high risk of exploitation or being sexually exploited but does not meet the direct work threshold. We always recommend making initial enquiries, even if it does not appear the young person meets threshold so we can provide recommendations around engagement techniques, resources for work, safeguarding and disruption of perpetrators.	We also have our Ambitions Initiative which has been created to highlight and focus on the <i>individual</i> young person's drive, interests, skill set and ambitions to promote skills, confidence and selfbelief in ways which have the potential to beneficial them now and when they are 21, 25, 30+ years of age. The ROUTES service is focused on tackling Serious Youth Violence (SYV) and Child Criminal Exploitation (CCE) across the county of is and Somerset delivered with the hope of "Providing young people with an alternative pathway.

This service has a clear remit of supporting young people where there are known risk/concerns of Serious Youth Violence and Child Criminal Exploitation specifically through County Lines.

The ROUTES service delivers relationship-based work to children and young people which incorporates a non-time limited, child centred pace of working, which is trauma informed, strengths based and holistic.

The intervention model has three key stages of delivery:

- Engagement and Assessment
- Therapeutic Support
- Recovery and Moving On

Extensive multi agency working is integral to the intervention model of safeguarding through all stages of support.

The service currently provides direct work to children and young people.

Up until the age of 25

Children and young people, parents/carers and professionals can all refer into the service.

Professionals should call ROUTES on **01179 349726** to discuss referrals prior to completing a referral form to ensure threshold is met and to reduce the likelihood of professionals completing referrals that are then not needed. At this point we refer to this an initial enquiry; we take a brief outline of concern, risk and steps that have been taken to safeguard the child so far. We then provide recommendations, which maybe to complete are referral form, or signposting to another service or that threshold/remit is not met.

If threshold is met (currently threshold is if a young person is being criminally exploited because of county lines exploitation) and we have capacity, we will ask for a referral form to be completed and we can then allocate a project worker. We provide professional consultation (until capacity becomes available) when we do not have capacity to allocate a project worker for 1-1 support, but there are high levels of significant risk and harm.

As with BASE we always recommend making initial enquiries, even if it does not appear the young person meets threshold so we can provide recommendations etc.

We also have our **Ambitions Initiative which** has been created to highlight and focus on the individual young person's drive, interests, skill set and ambitions to promote skills, confidence and selfbelief in ways which have the potential to beneficial them now and when they are 21, 25, 30+ years of age. This is part of the support offered to children and young people already accessing our service.

Jump Start Leadership (14-18 yrs.) provides an opportunity to volunteer within the Jump Start Clubs or similar, gaining experience of leading activities and what is involved in running a club. There are also opportunities to gain a qualification that could help increase their confidence, self-esteem, and job prospects.

Escapeline

Escapeline offer a youth worker and mentor (ex-gang member) to carry out detached work with young people identified as being at risk or on the cusp of being exploited by county line gangs. Our work involves building positive relationships with young people either as a 2-1 or small group work providing education and awareness on exploitation and criminal gangs.

Escapeline provides a 1-1 telephone support for parents whose children are being criminally or sexually exploited by county line gangs. The service provides confidential, independent, non-judgemental support.

Alongside the parent support, Escapeline also provide awareness and educational sessions on child exploitation and county lines to parents.
